In some states, it could be illegal to take a photo of your ballot. When in doubt, take a photo of your "I Voted" sticker instead!



Mask up when you line up on Election Day!

Be prepared for long lines at the polls: bring water, snacks and a face mask—bring extra for others who may not be as prepared!



Mail-in voting is safe and fair. Most states allow you to track your ballot at every step.



Voting by mail may feel new, but it's been a tried-and-true method throughout history.

Some states have been voting exclusively by mail for decades.



Don't let anyone take away your right to vote.

If someone tries to intimidate you, call 866-OUR-VOTE to report the incident and get help.

For Spanish, call 866-VE-Y-VOTA.
For Arabic, call 844-YALLA-US.
For Asian languages, call 888-API-VOTE.

In many states, you have the right to cast a provisional ballot.
