The Data Quality Campaign (DQC) leads a national effort to improve the **policies, practices, and conditions** that empower individuals to use data effectively to improve student outcomes from early childhood through the workforce.





Individuals face unique barriers to achieving their education and career goals.

Data sharing and linkages can support conversations about how to provide the **360-degree support** individuals need to succeed.

How can you create a data ecosystem that supports your goals?





Start with your questions

Be clear about how data supports your goals.

- Develop policy and practice questions that will set the priorities for action with data
- Determine the information needed to answer those questions and track progress towards goals



Determine data use needs

Different data is used for different purposes.

- What decision points should the data support?
- Who needs to use the data?
- What form of access is most needed?
 - Public report?
 - Analytical tool?
 - Operational tool?



Establish data governance

Define responsibilities surrounding data decisionmaking.

- Ensure there is a clear, transparent, process for how decisions will be made about how data is shared, used, and protected



Build trust with your community

People will not use data they don't trust or understand.

- Engage stakeholders in the creation of policies for data collection and use
- Communicate the value of your data initiative to student success and community well-being
- Center equity during every step of the data use process



Prioritize privacy and ethical data use practices

Safeguards are critical to effective data use.

- Ensure privacy and security best practices are in place
- Be transparent about how data is used and protected
- Ensure everyone who has access to individual information knows their role to protect it



Invest in capacity for data use

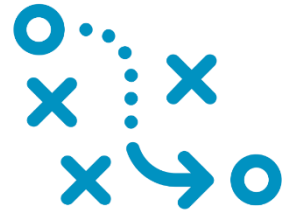
Data use requires people, time, money, and technology.

- Allocate resources to support data use
- Understand and support training needs
- Account for future changes in technology

People are critical to the success of data initiatives.

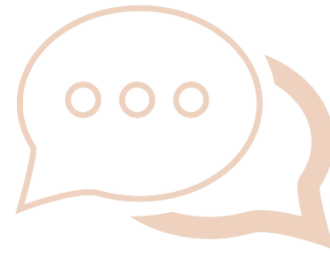


Short-term strategies



- ✓ Use the bully pulpit and communications to promote value of data to meeting city goals
- ✓ Map your city and state's data landscape and existing infrastructure
- ✓ Identify potential partnerships and data champions in the community
- ✓ Conduct focus groups with stakeholders to understand data needs, concerns, and challenges
- ✓ Consider a “quick win” that could be possible as a proof of concept or pilot effort
